Vllaznim (Avdyl) Jetishi

(born 10/01/1978, Albanian from Brekoc/Brekovac, Gjakovë/Đakovica municipality, electrician, member of KLA)

Vllaznim began to study law at the Law School in Prishtinë/Priština, but then stopped studying and found a job at the *Elektromotor* factory in Gjakovë/Đakovica. With his brother Dukagjin and five relatives, he joined the KLA on 5 May 1998. He was engaged in the transfer of weapons from Albania, through the village of **Devë/Dev**. Vllaznim was killed on **14 July 1998** in clashes with Serb forces in the area of the *Dev*a border outpost, while he was returning from Albania. His cousin Qazim was wounded. Yugoslav Army soldiers transported the dead Vllaznim and wounded Qazim to the hospital in Gjakovë/Đakovica. Vllaznim's family was faced with difficulties trying to recover his body, but finally managed to bury him on 16 July 1998 at the cemetery in Brekoc/Brekovac.

Ali (Myftar) Hasanaj

(born 16/06/1919, Albanian from Hereç/Ereç, Gjakovë/Đakovica municipality, farmer, two children)

Ali would occasionally put his cows out to pasture, even after the war had begun. On one occasion, Serb police, who controlled the village from the low hills above Hereç/Ereç, opened fire on the cattle, wounding a cow in the ear. On **15 July 1998**, Ali went over to the house of Ali Sahiti [**Hereç/Ereç**] for the fourth day in a row, to pay his respects over the killings of 20 men from Hereç/Ereç, Sllup/Sllup and Dujakë/Dujaka

near the border post at Koshare/Košare [see record]. He never returned home. His body was found near the house of Tahir Zeneli. He had been killed with a firearm. His family buried him in the meadow where the men killed at Koshare/Košare had been buried. After the war, Ali's mortal remains were transferred to the Cemetery for Fallen Combatants in Hereç/Ereç.

Zdravko (Krst) Radunović

(born 16/09/1955, Montenegrin from Pejë/Peć, community inspector, three children)

On **16 July 1998**, Zdravko and his friend Bodo Vlahović went to Gjakovë/Đakovica to work. At around 14:30h, they left Gjakovë/Đakovica for Dobrixhë/Dobrić in order to visit Zdravko's relatives, who had previously had some problems with the KLA. On the way to Dobrixhë/Dobrić [on the Gjakovë/Đakovica - Deçan/Dečane road], in the village of **Dujakë/Dujak**, they were stopped by two KLA members [their identity is known to the HLC]. While Budo managed to escape, Zdravko was forced into a car and driven to the local KLA headquarters in Glogjan/Glodane. In mid-September 1998, his body was found near **Liqeni i Radoniqit/Radonjičko jezero (Radoniq Lake)**. Zdravko's wife, Momirka, visited the exhibition of clothes belonging to the victims found in the *Liqeni i Radoniqit/Radonjičko jezero* canal [at the *Pashtrik/Paštrik* hotel, Gjakovë/Đakovica], but did not recognize Zdravko's clothes. After this, his body is buried in the village Piskotë/Piskote. In January 1999, Serb police informed Zdravko's family that the two KLA members who had stopped Zdravko and Budo had been arrested and had said that Zdravko had been killed and his body thrown near the *Liqeni i Radoniqit/Radonjičko jezero*. On 22 October 2004, the Missing Persons Commission of the Republic of Serbia informed Momirka that Zdravko's body had been positively identified. The family recovered the body at Merdare on 28 October 2004, and buried it at the cemetery in Paraćin
