

Enver studied at the Teachers' Training College in Gjakovë/Đakovica. He joined the KLA following the clashes in Glllogjan/Glodan of 24 March 1998 [see record]. During 1998, he was wounded twice in clashes with Serb forces.

Rrustem had worked as a judge at the Deçan/Dečane Municipal Court before 1990s. During 1990s he had spent some time in Germany. At the beginning of summer 1998, he returned to Kosovo and joined the KLA.

Lumni had completed the Military Academy in Rajlovac, near Sarajevo [BiH]. He had worked at the Batajnica Airport [Serbia] until 1993, when he moved to Germany. At the onset of the war in Kosovo he went to Albania, where he was responsible for the training of new soldiers.

Enver, Rrustem, Lumni and Xhavit died on **6 July 1998** fighting against Serb forces in **Loxhë/Loda**. Rrustem, Lumni, Xhavit and Enver were buried on 7 July 1998 in the cemetery in Isniq/Istinić. Enver's body was transferred on 6 July 2000 to the Alajs' family graveyard in Drenoc/Drenovac. Lumni's body was transferred on 1 September 1999 to the Cemetery for Fallen Combatants in Stanoc i Poshtëm/Donje Stanovce [Vushtrri/Vučitrn municipality]. Rrustem still rests in the cemetery in Isniq/Istinić.

Radoš (Radovan) Paunović

(born 17/06/1941, Montenegrin from Raushiq/Raušić, Pejë/Peć municipality, farmer)

After the death of his mother Milena, Radoš, a.k.a. "Lakoša", lived alone in the Paunovićs' family home in **Raushiq/Raušić**. He had never married. On **6 July 1998**, a group of KLA members came to his house from Vranoc/Vranovac and took Radoš to an unknown location. When an Albanian neighbour asked them why they were taking him, since he was a good man, they threatened that they would take him too. Since that day, no trace of Radoš has

been found. His fate has not been clarified to date. Radoš is registered on the ICRC list of missing persons under YUK-0500-23-01.

Nazmije (Ymer) Hoti

(born 1929, Albanian woman from Pejë/Peć, housewife, three children)

In May 1997, the elderly Nazmije and her family moved to Ulcinj [Montenegro] because of the tense situation in Pejë/Peć. On 6 July 1998, Nazmije returned to **Pejë/Peć** alone and stayed with her daughter Sanije Krasniqi. Sanije last saw her on the morning of **7 July 1998**, when Nazmije went to check on her house in JNA Street. Two days later [9 July 1998], Sanije was told by some people that Serb forces had killed her mother. She immediately went to the Islamic religious authority (Vakuf), where she was told that the police had informed the Vakuf that they had discovered Nazmije's body earlier that day in Ndrece Koni's house, which lay a short distance from Nazmije's house. Members of the Vakuf buried Nazmije later that day in the Town Cemetery. After the war, in July 2000, Nazmije's family transferred her mortal remains to the cemetery in the *Dardania III/Brežanik III* borough of Pejë/Peć.

Tahir (Canë) Tahiri

(born 13/11/1982, Albanian from Baran, Pejë/Peć municipality, secondary school student, member of KLA)

As a KLA member, Tahir was tasked with keeping watch in his village and in the neighbouring village of Turjakë/Turjak. On **7 July 1998**, at about 12:00h, Tahir was seriously wounded in clashes with Serb forces in **Turjakë/Turjak**. His fellow combatants transported him to the KLA field hospital in Irzniq/Rznić [Deçan/Dečani municipality], where he died the
