

tions in the villages of Landovicë/Landovica [Prizren municipality] and Rogovë/Rogovo [Gjakovë/Đakovica municipality].

The houses of the brothers Ibrahim, Selami, Sokol and Fahredin Dina were situated on the outskirts of **Rahovec/Orahovac** on the way to the village of Xërxë/Zrze, between the Out-patient's Clinic and the *Jaha Petrol* pumps. Early in the morning of **19 July 1998**, most of the members of the Dina extended family had fled the town. Nine remained at home: Ibrahim, his wife Xhemile and son Fatmir with his wife Elvira, Ibrahim's brother Sokol and his wife Gjylsyme with their son Muhamed, Ibrahim and Sokol's brother Selami, and Hysen, Fahredin's son.

Because of the shelling, they went down to the cellars. In one were Ibrahim, Xhemile, Fatmir, Sokol, Hysen and Selami, and in the other Muhamed, Gjylsyme and Elvira. The police came in the afternoon. Without any warning, they threw hand-grenades into the cellars, killing Ibrahim, Xhemile, Sokol, Hysen and Selami, and wounding Fatmir. Muhamed, Gjylsyme and Elvira saw him in the yard and heard shooting as they started to flee. The same day, the Serb police collected the bodies in a lorry and drove them away. Selami's body remained in the cellar. In August 1998, the family removed his body to the Muslim cemetery in Rahovec/Orahovac.

After the war, Hysen, Xhemile and Ibrahim's mortal remains were found in graves beside the rubbish dump [behind the Muslim cemetery]. Hysen's mortal remains were re-buried on 8 April 2005, Xhemile's on 15 July 2005 and Ibrahim's on 28 May 2007, at the Muslim cemetery. Sokol and Fatmir are still considered missing. On the ICRC list, Sokol is registered under BLG-803855-01 and Fatmir under BLG-803601-0.

Haxhi (Sahit) Kastrati

(born 1905 Albanian from Rahovec/Orahovac, three children)

Haxhi lived with his daughter Xhyfe and son-in-law Sylejman. He was immobile. On the afternoon of **19 July 1998**, they were at home [**Rahovec/Orahovac**], when Serb police entered the house of Ibrahim Dina [see record], 100 metres from their home. They heard shooting, so Xhyfe and her husband immediately left the house and sought shelter in the house of a neighbour, Ibrahim Hajda. Five or ten minutes later, they saw eight policemen entering their house, after which they heard shots. The same policemen then came to the house of Ibrahim Hajda and took the men and women they found in the house with them. Other policemen then took them to the prison in Prizren. After being released from prison, they returned home. Xhyfe and her husband found their house empty. On the bed on which Haxhi had been lying they found three spent cartridges. The blanket the old man used to cover himself was missing. They never reported Haxhi's disappearance to the ICRC.

Hidajet (Fejzullah) Haxhijaha

(born 15/01/1930, Albanian from Rahovec/Orahovac, farmer, seven children)

Hidajet's wife, sons and their families left their house at about 09:00h on **19 July 1998**. Hidajet stayed behind to set the cow loose. His son Nexmedin saw that his father was not following them, and went back to get him [**Rahovec/Orahovac**]. In the yard, he encountered two Serb policemen in green uniforms who immediately opened fire on him, but he managed to escape. The family fled to Mamushë/Mamuša, and for a long time did not know what had happened to Hidajet. Nexmedin and Hidajet's other son, Reshat, came back to the town on 11 September 1998. They found their father's body upstairs in the burnt-out family home. They called the police, who conducted an on-site investigation. In his father's
