

which no trace of her could be found. In fear of Albanian soldiers, Radomir hid in the attic, while Aleksandra and Krstiva stayed on the ground floor of the house. Before long, the soldiers came to the house, passed the women by and headed for the attic. As soon as she saw them going up to get Radomir, Aleksandra ran after them. Krstiva heard yelling and screaming followed by three gun shots, and ran out into a field, from where she could see Milisav's and Radomir's houses being set on fire.

Four months later, on 23 October 1998, some clothes and other personal items belonging to Milosav, Radomir, Sultana and Aleksandra were found near the petrol station in the village of Runik/Rudnik, but their bodies are still missing. Milosav, Aleksandra, Sultana and Radomir were registered on the ICRC list of missing persons under YUK-050087-01, YUK-050087-03, YUK-050087-02 and BLG-803510-01 respectively.

Čedo (Jovan) Kandić

(born 11/03/1943, Serb from Kotorr/Kotor, Skënderaj/Srbica municipality, welder at the *Termoelektr*o company, single)

In the village of Kotorr/Kotore there lived five Serb families. Čedo lived with his stepmother Angelina. Čedo's brother Radoslav, who was a policeman, often came over to visit them. All the Serbs from the village, except Čedo, his stepmother Angelina and their cousin Mileva Vuković had left the village before 13 June 1998. On Saturday, **13 June 1998**, at about 11:00h, three vehicles came and parked behind Čedo's and Angelina's house. Čedo and Angelina were at home. Seven KLA members [the names of three of them are known to the HLC] entered the house and searched all the rooms looking for weapons. Not having found any weapons, they departed, but leaving their vehicles behind. Two hours later,

they returned and ordered Čedo to accompany them, saying to Angelina they would bring him back after taking a statement from him. As they took him out of the village [**Kotorr/Kotore**], two Albanian neighbours asked them why they were taking Čedo and received the same answer: they would bring him back after questioning. The Kandićs subsequently learned that Čedo was taken to the KLA-run prison in **Likoc/Likovac**. Čedo remains registered on the ICRC list of missing persons under YUK-050015-01.

Naser (Hajriz) Lani

(born 28/02/1958, Albanian from Llaushë/Lauša, Skënderaj/Srbica municipality, auto electrician, member of KLA)

Naser had worked for the *Kosovotrans* transportation company for a period of time, before he started working at the *Feronikl* company in Glllogoc/Glogovac. During the 1990s, Naser took part in demonstrations against the Serb authorities. In 1998 he joined the KLA. He was wounded on **15 June 1998** during clashes with Serb forces in **Llaushë/Lauša**. His fellow combatants took him to the hospital in Likoc/Likovac, where he succumbed to his wounds on 27 June 1998. He was buried initially in Llaushë/Lauša. After the war, on 22 August 1999, his family transferred his mortal remains to the Cemetery for Fallen Combatants and War Victims in Polac/Poļjane.

On the morning of **17 June 1998**, Živojin went to Siboc/Sibovac [Obiliq/Obilić] to check on his house and feed his cattle. On returning from Obiliq/Obilić, where he had taken refuge for a while, he was taken
