

stomach, chest and head from an automatic weapon. Serbian police performed an on-site investigation and took his body to the Forensic Medicine Institute in Prishtinë/Priština for an autopsy. His family buried him on 15 February 1998 in the cemetery in Obri e Epërme/Gornje Obrinje.

Avdullah (Behram) Nika

(born 2/03/1952, Albanian from Gllanasellë/Gladno Selo, Glllogoc/Glogovac municipality, electrician, six children)

Avdullah lived with his family in Gllanasellë/Gladno Selo and worked at the transformer station in **Çikatovë e Vjeter/Staro Çikatovo**. On **14 February 1998**, at around 08:00h, he left to do his shift. He was supposed to work for 24 hours. As he failed to return home by breakfast time on 15 February, his son Ylber went looking for him. Transformer station guard Hasan Ahmeti told him that there had been an incident with Serb police. He therefore went with his uncle to the police precinct in Glllogoc/Glogovac, where he found out that his father had been killed and that his body had been taken to the morgue in Prishtinë/Priština. The Nikas recovered Avdullah's body on 16 April 1998. He had three gunshot wounds and other injuries. Avdullah was buried by his family the next day in the cemetery in the *Nika* neighbourhood of his native village of Gllanasellë/Gladno Selo.

The day after the funeral, the Nikas found out from Nezir Sylejmani, who worked the same shift as Avdullah on the day he was killed, that some 10 police officers [the identity of one of them is known to the HLC] tied up Nezir and Avdullah and questioned them about the KLA. Then they took Avdullah into another room. Four or five minutes later, Nezir heard a volley of gunfire. The police told Nezir that Avdullah had tried to escape. Then they took his body away.

Feriz (Ibush) Demaku

(born 8/03/1936, Albanian from Obri e Epërme/Gornje Obrinje, Glllogoc/Glogovac municipality, farmer, nine children)

Serb forces launched an attack on Obri e Epërme/Gornje Obrinje on **16 February 1998**, which drove the residents to flee the village. Feriz's family fled to Bajicë/Banjica, while Feriz stayed at home. A month later, on 18 March 1998, Feriz's family was told that Feriz had disappeared in the woods of **Obri e Epërme/Gornje Obrinje** village. Later that day, Feriz's son Ymer went with a group of people looking for his father. They found his body in the woods, with multiple gunshot wounds, and buried him near the place where he was found. On 25 February 1999, on the arrival of the OSCE mission in Kosovo, Feriz's body was transferred to the cemetery in Obri e Epërme/Gornje Obrinje.

Shaban (Selman) Karaqica

(born 1/03/1929, Albanian from Gllanasellë/Gladno Selo, Glllogoc/Glogovac municipality, tradesman, five children)

Before the war, Shaban had worked at the coal factory in Obiliq/Obilic and later switched to commerce and agriculture. He lived with his wife Faza, daughter Shkurte, son Asllan and Asllan's wife and children in Glllogoc/Glogovac. When, on **28 February 1998**, he heard about the events in Likoshan/Likošane [see records], Shaban told his family that he would go to check out what was happening, without specifying where he would go. He was never to be seen again. Asllan was told by some people in town that the Serbs had arrested Shaban near the *Feronikl* factory [**Glllogoc/Glogovac**] and taken him to an unknown location. He eventually found his father in the morgue in Prishtinë/Priština, among the bodies of victims from Likoshan/Likošane.
