Hajdar (Smail) Smajli

(born 1920, Albanian from Likoshan/Likošane, Gllgoc/Glogovac municipality, farmer, six children)

Brahim (Ajet) Avdulli

(born 1/01/1943, Albanian from Likoshan/Likošane, Gllgoc/Glogovac municipality, wall painter, seven children)

On 22 September 1998, Serbian police and military forces launched an offensive against the KLA in **Likoshan/Likošane**. The local civilians, including Brahim, Hajdar and Hamit, fled the village and gathered on the nearby field called *Shena*. The next day, **23 September 1998**, Serb forces surrounded them, separated the men from the women and children and frisked them all. They ordered the women, children and elderly to get out of the field, but Hajdar and Hamit stayed, as they were unable to walk. That was the last time their families saw them alive. Brahim was released and he and his family headed towards Gradicë/Gradica, until they were intercepted by a group of Serb soldiers, who then took Brahim back with them to the field. The next day, the bodies of Hajdar, Brahim and Hamit were found in the *Shena* field. They were buried on 25 September 1998 at the same spot where they had been killed. After the war, on 11 September 1999, they were given a proper burial in the Cemetery for War Victims in Likoshan/Likošane.

Selim (Halil) Miftari

(born 1924, Albanian from Likoshan/Likošane, Gllgoc/Glogovac municipality, farmer, four children)

Selim stayed at home after the residents of **Likoshan/Likošane**, fleeing the Serb attack, left the village on **23 September 1998** to take refuge on Mount *Çiçavicë/Čičavica*. The next day, after the situation had calmed down a bit, Selim's son Rrahim

returned to the village and found his father's body outside the front door of their family home. Selim had been shot in the head. The next day, [25 September 1998], the Miftaris buried Selim in the cemetery in the *Imeri* neighbourhood. After the war, on 11 September 1999, Selim's mortal remains were transferred to the Cemetery for War Victims in Likoshan/Likošane.

Miftar (Shaban) Kurrumeli

(born 2/01/1940, Albanian from Gllanasellë/Gladno Selo, Gllgoc/Glogovac municipality, craftsman, seven children)

Miftar fled Gllanasellë/Gladno Selo with his family and other local residents when Serb forces attacked that village on 22 September 1998. The Kurrumelis went to Likoshan/Likošane, where they found refuge at the home of Shaban Maliqi. The next day, **23 September 1998**, Serb forces shelled Likoshan/Likošane, so the local residents and refugees, including Miftar and his family, sought shelter on Mount *Çiçavicë/Čičavica*. As Miftar was making his way by foot towards a forest with his brother Xhemail and Shaban Maliqi, he stopped in **Likoshan/Likošane**, near the Qirez/Čirez and Krasmiroc/Krasmirovac junction, to help some people who had been wounded by a shell. Soon afterwards, Serb forces started arriving, so Miftar and the others took flight. Serb forces opened fire on them. Miftar was fatally shot. Ramadan, Miftar's nephew, found his body on the night of 24 September 1998. Two days later, after the situation had calmed down, he buried him in the cemetery in Gllanasellë/Gladno Selo.
